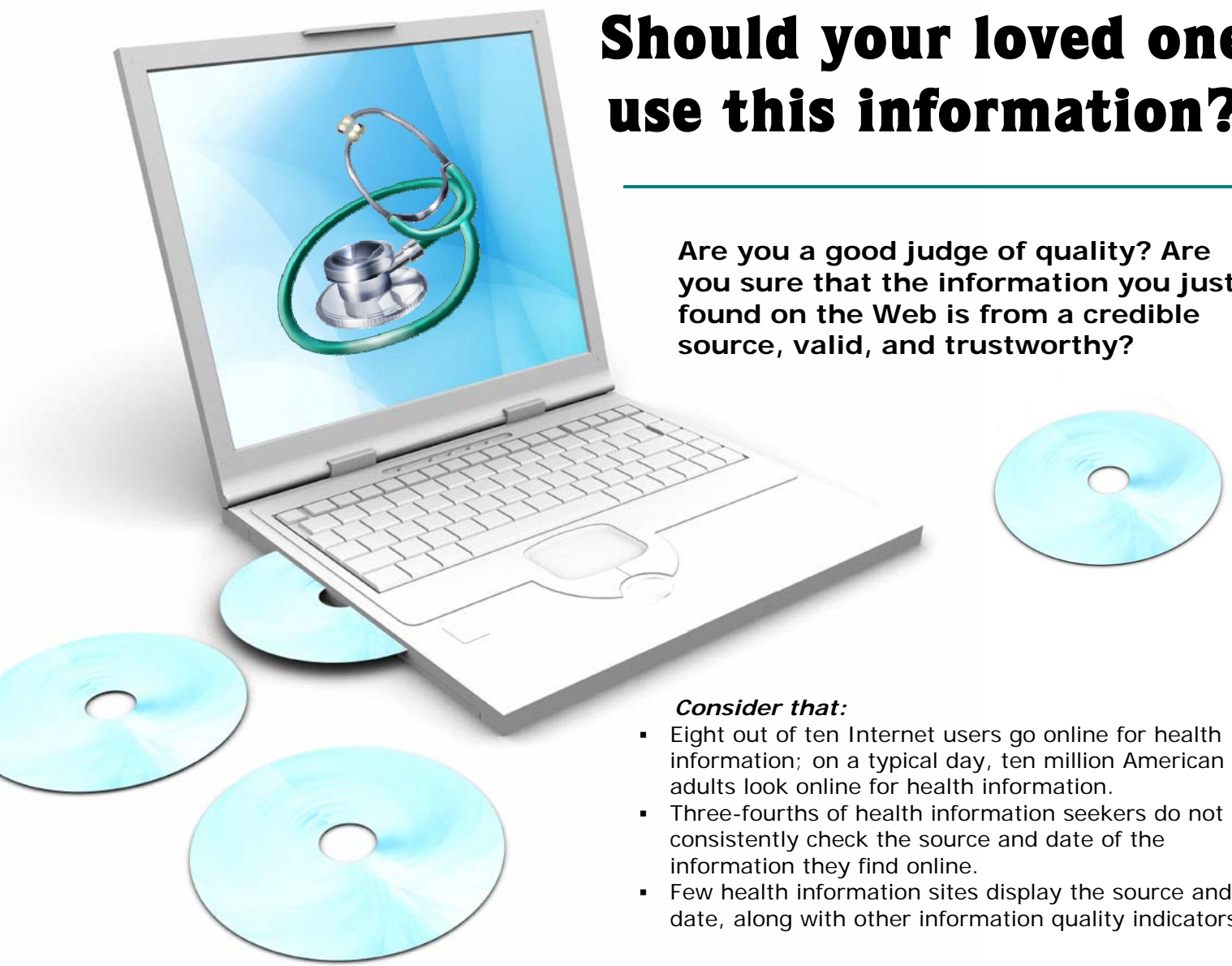


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# Should your loved one use this information?

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Are you a good judge of quality? Are you sure that the information you just found on the Web is from a credible source, valid, and trustworthy?



***Consider that:***

- Eight out of ten Internet users go online for health information; on a typical day, ten million American adults look online for health information.
- Three-fourths of health information seekers do not consistently check the source and date of the information they find online.
- Few health information sites display the source and date, along with other information quality indicators.
